FLOW CHART FOR APPLICATION INTO THE RESPIRATORY SUBSPECIALTY TRAINING PROGRAMME FOR MALAYSIAN NON-MINISTRY OF HEALTH (MOH) DOCTORS

Entry of Trainees into the Respiratory Subspecialty Programme
Duration 3 years (non-inclusive of 35 days continuous breaks during training)

Gazetted as a General Medical Specialist/Lecturer (6 months for Internal Medicine, 18 months for MRCP or it's equivalent) Application (with curriculum vitae) for entry into Subspecialty Respiratory Medicine 18 months after being gazetted as a general medicine specialist / OR has at least been working as a clinical specialist for one year (Subject to approval by the Respiratory Subspecialty Committee) **Approved Applications** Malaysian non-MOH trainees applying for attachment Training/Working in Universities in MOH facilities: (As per universities' regulations) Applications must be made 3 months prior intake: ie. end September/ end March every year Applications must apply from the Director General of Health (DG), MOH via their respective Deans

DG, MOH will then reply to the respective Deans with a cc. to the Head of Services Respiratory Medicine who will arrange the necessary training centres/trainees

(subjected to the availability of training centres and trainees) after discussion with the Respiratory Subcommittee MOH

The trainer / trainee ratio is 1:2

(Proposed training centres & trainers from respective Deans is encouraged)

*(MOH trainees takes precedent over non-MOH trainees)




Trainees must apply for :

- 1) Annual practicing certificate (APC) to practice at selected hospitals / institutions.
- 2) Credentialing and previling (C&P) certificate from respective hospitals / institutions



Once both documents are available, in line with the needs of Section 34 (C) Medical Act 1971, (Circular KKM/87/P2-1/27/Jld-4(69) dated 13 March 2013) for the purposes of managing patients, applicants / hospitals has to apply for a written approval from the DG of Health, MOH to train in the respective hospitals / institutions.



Trainee then can practice only when official reply from DG of Health, MOH is available

Apart from the above:

- 1. The trainee's Institution must be ready to indemnify MOH should there be any medico-legal issues occurring during the training period
- 2. All statistical data, patient's records and other information obtained during the training period are confidential and cannot be used for any purposes including reports / publications without prior written consent from the DG of Health
- 3. The government shall not be responsible for any injuries sustained or diseases contracted during the training period
- 4. Trainees are bound to the *Peraturan-Peraturan Pegawai Awam (Kelakuan dan Tatatertib)*, existing laws and regulations prepared by the hospital / instution from time to time
- 5. Trainees are not allowed to sign Medical certificates (MC), death certificates, writing of medical report which may bring medico-legal implications
- 6. When attending seminars / courses organized by other agencies, all expenses shall not be borne by MOH
